

Uncertainty over £200 million extra lottery money for Play

News that an extra £200 million lottery money earmarked for play will be absorbed into the general funds within the Big Lottery Fund is causing concern amongst the Play Sector.

The money was originally ring fenced in a pre-election promise made by Chris Smith in 2001 to “ earmark £200 million for the next round of the New Opportunities Fund to create 2,000 new children’s safe play areas throughout the UK.”

This dedicated fund for play is now set to be absorbed into the new Big Lottery Fund which does not allow ring fencing of any kind.

This means that the money will no longer be additional, but that £200 million will go to Play altogether from across all the lottery distributors over time.

The Play sector is concerned that this will ultimately mean significantly less goes to Play and that small projects in deprived areas will have to compete for the funds that remain against much larger and better equipped organisations.

In an article in Play Today, Estelle Morris, Minister for the Arts, insisted the Government is still committed to Play. She said:

“We remain committed to supporting play and are convinced of the benefits it can bring. We need to balance this commitment with the new approaches to managing the lottery and we will respond to the play review in due course.”

SkillsActive has written to the Secretary of State for Culture Media and Sport for an explanation of how the Government intend to ensure that lottery funding for Play is allocated strategically and primarily according to need, as recommended in Frank Dobson’s review of Play.
