STEPHEN LADYMAN MP VISITS DOG AND DUCK LEISURE PARKS

Dr Stephen Ladyman, MP for Thanet South, today visited the Dog and Duck Leisure Parks near Canterbury to see for himself the opportunities the park provides for local people, local wildlife, and holiday makers.

Stephen, who is also a Government health minister, was given a tour of the leisure park to view the conservation projects which have earned the park its David Bellamy Conservation Award, including the recently erected Barn Owl boxes which park owner-operator Sue Fagg hopes will support the local Barn Owl population.

Stephen met some of the staff who help run the Dog and Duck Leisure Park and presented them with certificates for recently completing their "Welcome All" training, enabling them to provide enhanced accessibility for customers in the service they provide.

Stephen then viewed artwork by the local primary school children who have benefited from a donation from the Dog and Duck to build more play facilities.

Stephen said: "It is great to see a socially responsible employer in my constituency putting the local community at the heart of its operations. The Dog and Duck take staff training seriously and it is reassuring for users of the park that capable and qualified staff help run it. Congratulations to all the staff who have achieved their "Welcome All" certificate which makes the Dog and Duck even more welcoming for everybody.

"The Dog and Duck is also aware of the needs of local wildlife and recognises the contribution caravan parks across the UK can make to increasing and maintaining biodiversity.
